She later became President of her District and later the Parish Association. She has served. She is the recipient of numerous local, regional and international awards.

Sadie Comrie has served more than four decades in the education system. On graduating from Bethlehem Moravian College, she served as classroom teacher/librarian and guidance counsellor at various schools; developed literacy programmes; and was also involved in sports, music and the promotion of culture.

The ninth National female President of the JTA has served as liaison officer with responsibility for liaising between the Ministry of Education and the JTA. Mrs. Comrie, a former principal of May Pen Primary school is the recipient of numerous awards including the Prime Ministers' Medal of Appreciation.

The JTA still hosts the annual Pre-Service Teacher Forum, her brain-child initiative for members of the YPAs. An avid advocate of meaningful use of technology in education, she spearheaded the launch of the JTA's website and the first live stream of a JTA event during her year as president. She has Chaired several committees of the JTA and currently chairs the Board of Trustees.

She is a Director of the Gleaner Company Media Limited having also served on several public sector boards.

The former Principal of the Year, JTA Roll of Honour and Prime Minister's Medal of Appreciation recipient, Nadine A Molloy has a simple personal philosophy –"*leave it a little better than you found it*".

Mrs. Fay Saunders will remembered as a trailblazer who served with distinction as a Trade Unionist and Legislator. She was the first female to serve as president of the Jamaica Teachers' Association, and the first person to serve as president for two terms. Her strident yet measured advocacy, led to her serving for four years as Vice President of the then prestigious World Confederation of Organizations of the Teaching Profession now Education International.

Mrs. Saunders became the first and only female, to date, to serve in the position of Secretary General of the Jamaica Teachers' Association. This phenomenal woman also served as a Legislator in the Senate and held the position of Parliamentary Secretary in the Ministry of Education during the 1970's.

Mrs. Ellorine Walker, O.D., was an outstanding educator in her practice in the classroom, her leadership of schools, her contribution to the growth and development of the Jamaica Teachers' Association (JTA) and through her contributions to community and national development.

She was a classroom teacher and later principal of the Central Branch Elementary School. Following the completion of an honors degree at the University of the West Indies, she took up principalship of the Merl Grove High School. Under her leadership, the school grew not only numerically but also in programme offerings.

She held various leadership positions in the Jamaica Union of Teachers and the JTA, becoming President of the JTA in 1975.

Dr. Dorothy Raymond was associated with the Jamaica Teachers' Association for almost Fifty (50) years as an advocate, negotiator and strategist.

Perhaps the happiest day of her JTA life came when, in 1988, she was elected President Elect and, as such, paved the way to her becoming the National President in 1989. She became the 3rd female National President serving from 1989-1990. That for Dorothy was a big thing not so much for her personally but for what it signified - the continued ascendancy and recognition of women within the leadership of the organization.

Mrs. Vernon was a very passionate and strong leader who had the outstanding ability, to motivate and inspire others. Her diplomacy, her charisma, her strong belief in the education system, her passion for the children under her care, her belief in God and her humour gave her the winning edge as a distinguished educator in a career spanning 34 years; 27 years as a classroom teacher and 7 years as Principal.

Mrs. Rosemarie Evangeline Vernon became President of the JTA in 1991 while she was a classroom teacher at Alpha Primary School in Kingston. Helen Ramsay Stills became President of the Jamaica Teachers' Association in 1995 and sought in a variety of ways, to promote continuing professional development of teachers. It was for this reason that she conceptualized and implemented, during her presidency, the Professional Development Day to focus on issues related to the professional development of teachers.

The proposal to name the Day "The Helen R. Stills Professional Development Day" was presented to and unanimously accepted by the Annual Conference held in August 2000.

Dr. Nadine Scott was a Trustee and the seventh female President of the Association. She served on many of the standing committees of the Association, chaired the Tertiary Committee and represented the JTA at many international conferences. Before her stint as the third Principal of the Excelsior Community College, she was a lecturer at the Institute of Education, UWI and the Principal Lecturer and Head of the Art Department of St. Joseph's Teachers College.

Dr. Scott was an ardent and committed teacher leader whose contribution to the regional and international teachers' movement has been recognized by several international organizations. Her dedication to teacher development and quality education through the Arts is well-recognized.


