





Tackling Issues In Jamaica's Education System

In 1962, the Academic (school) year began in January. The school year was shorter. Easter was two weeks long and, because many schools were denominationally owned, classes were never held during Holy Week and many of the principals (headmasters/mistresses) were ministers of the sponsoring church. Christmas holidays lasted three weeks and the Summer six weeks to two months

In 1962, there were many independent schools, to compensate for the relatively few places in the established high schools. Here is a list of these schools – all but one of which no longer exist: Bodmin College, Buxton College, Crandall High School, Durham College of Commerce, Gaynestead High School, Strathford High School, St. Martin's High School, St. Simon's College, Tutorial College and Waulgrove College.

These institutions filled the yawning gap in the education system which lingered up to the 1980s. Only Gaynestead has survived.

These institutions, together with a myriad of trade training centres, complemented the education system which consisted mainly of elementary (now primary and all age) schools and a few high schools.

In 1962 we became an independent nation within the British Empire and Commonwealth. The school year started January, until it was changed in 1964 to September with the promulgation of the current Education Act. In 1962 there were more than 500 schools with total enrolment of just over 250,000. Most of these were elementary schools with school leaving age at 15 years.

There were fewer than 100 High schools with enrolment of under 50,000. There were also three technical high schools. The Common Entrance Examination was just five years old and only 3,500 children aged eleven plus were awarded FREE places.

In 1962 we were recruiting teachers from Europe and North America for our high schools and many of our "Established Churches" were largely curated by expatriates.

The population of Jamaica was approximately 1.5 million and the literacy rate was under 50%, and the retention system operating

in the education system created the well-known character "Big Boy". A decade into independence, we had not made significant progress, which forced the government to introduce a literacy initiative called JAMAL.

Sixty years on, what is our education system like?

We have full enrolment in our more than 1,000 early childhood institutions. Regular attendance is another matter. Our primary institutions reach learners in almost every community, despite our challenging topography.

Our 164 secondary level institutions cater to most of our primary graduates, with the remainder being nestled into the "all age" schools. Some later find their way into the higher levels of these "high" schools, the remainder, an estimated eight per cent, leave school at grade 9, without the benefit of a secondary education.

There can be no disputing that our governments, elected since 1944 (first election under Universal Adult Suffrage), have built many schools. The extinction of the privately owned and managed high schools, cited above, is proof of this. Indeed, our history from 1835 is one of school building and school closure. Many of our schools are denominally owned but publicly funded. The reality is we have pri-

mary and secondary schools that are underpopulated. School attendance is still a problem, despite social intervention programmes, like PATH. Transportation is still a major issue for many families as is the other issues of books, uniforms, and food. It is estimated that average national attendance is three and a half days — higher at the secondary level — and overall performance is not to expectation.

Indeed, both the Report of the Patterson-led Commission (2021) and the predecessor Rae Davies Task Force (2004) commented on the inadequacies of the education System and made some very valuable recommendations. Problem is, governments have never fully implemented the recommendations contained in these reports, yet go on to create other Commissions to enquire into the very system they have previously investigated.

In his recent G. Arthur Brown Lecture at the Bank of Jamaica, former Prime Minister. Golding referenced the Professor Patterson Commission Report (2021) which, inter alia, spoke to the performance of students and, by extension, the deficiencies of education system. This was juxtaposed against the 2004 Rae Davis-led Task Force Report which reflected the same issue. Golding did not lose the opportunity to attack the JTA for its "...institutional resistance to reform ...", reciting the oft-misconstrued leave entitlement of four months leave after five years and the thirteen weeks of school holidays that teachers currently enjoy.

Obviously, the former Prime Minister misreads Regulation 64 as an entitlement. If all teachers are "entitled" to this leave, the Ministers of Finance and Education will have to retroactively compensate the many thousands of teachers who have been denied this "entitlement" every fifth year (fourth, in the case of principals) of their engagement.

The former Prime Minister also proffered another reason for performance, intimating by way of example, the role of parental involvement. He also spoke to the \$122-B allocation to education. No one disputes the fact that the Education Sector gets the lion's share of the budgetary allocation. This is only fitting, having regard to the percentage of Jamaicans engaged in the education system. His contention is that the country does not get value for money.

And, perhaps he is right. All Jamaicans will insist that we do not get value for out tax dollar. We don't get value at our hospitals, at the Collectorates, the quality of our roads does not justify the taxes we pay and, certainly, teachers will insist that they are not compensated for their effort.

Performance pay is resisted, Golding said. But why not?

Why would a Union accept performance pay for its members or differential payment based on scarcity in a particular subject... Mathematics and Science, for example? Persons who make such suggestions obviously do not understand the job of a teacher in the school setting. A teacher's job is much more than teaching the prescribed subject. It involves character development and the socialization of the Paying a teacher who teaches a scarce subject does not address the other real issues in the classroom.

We have had reports on the performance of our schools since the 1840s and recommendations made, few of which were implemented, even then by the colonial authority. A teachers' union only came into being in January 1894. By then, the predecessor Jamaica Union of Teachers (JUT) was battling the infamous colonial "Payment by Result" system which was in force up to the 1940.

Performance pay? Why would a Union agree to punish its members for the failings of Government?

The JTC Bill & the Public Sector Compensation Review:

The Arbiters of the Demise of Teacher Unionism in Jamaica?

The events of the past year concerning labour relations should trouble the mind of every practitioner in education, and indeed any well-thinking Jamaican. Teacher unionism in particular, has come under serious threat with the combined assault of the Jamaica Teaching Council Bill and the Public Sector Compensation Review.

On May 19, 2022 the Jamaica Teachers' Association, led by President Winston Smith made a fulsome submission to the Joint Select Committee on the Jamaica Teaching Council Act. The Gleaner reported "testy exchanges" between the Minister of Education Fayval Williams and the President. The Union took issue with several of the proposals in the Bill:

The very definition of who is a teacher is cause for concern in terms of the stipulations outlined in the Bill. Implemented as is, it would immediately separate some practitioners from the system, especially those at the pre-primary level and some categories within the tertiary sector.

In addition, the Bill has an innate bias when one considers the one-year period given for a practitioner to upgrade to trained-graduate status, since there is no degree or postgraduate programme that may be completed within that time.

The disproportionate composition of the Commission remains a challenge for teachers with only six persons representing the teacher out of a proposed twenty-three (23) member team. Further, as the union representing over 20, 000 teachers, the Jamaica Teachers' Association is not specifically named in the Bill as a stakeholder group to comprise this Commission, and this is cause for serious alarm.

The grievance process as outlined in the Bill is also flawed, as complaints against the teacher can be brought to the Board, the Council and the Ministry simultaneously. The possibility exists that three different results could be had from the three bodies outlined. The entire process can be circumvented and teachers can be summarily dis-

missed at any time on the basis of an expired license.

Practitioners should be very wary of the fact, that should the Bill be implemented in its current state, appraisals will now be conducted externally, by a central body; the Jamaica Teaching Council. Not only will this place the teacher at a grave disadvantage, but also it will remove much of the autonomy of school administrators.

The Union took particular umbrage to the fact that the Bill seems to seek to criminalise teachers with excessive fines and the court process involved, should one breach the clauses. The Bill suggests a fine of half a million dollars for the most serious offense named and; requires appearance at court which makes the offense criminal.

It is a most egregious act that the charge of an expired license could essentially leave the teacher with a criminal record. While the Bill speaks loudly on the matters outlined, it is deafeningly silent on the details of others including tenureship of teachers and the financing of the Commission that will regulate the system. The teachers will no doubt bear the burden of financing the Commission since no formula has been given for the determination of the

cost of the license. The Bill proposes to be an empowering legislation when there is no mention of how the profession will be so improved.

The JTA was by no means the only stakeholder group to have made submissions on the Bill: the tertiary sector, the umbrella group for churches, the private sector, amongst others all made submissions from their particular lens.

Protection of the Legacy of Unionism

Unionism in Jamaica is built, fundamentally, upon the bedrock of teacher advocacy. It is no wonder that the first operable labour union established only a few years after Emancipation was a teachers' union. Indeed, the Morant Bay Rebellion of 1865 was a labour rebellion, although it has hardly been given that status by those who would seek to undermine the collective efficacy that was so evident in a group of marginally literate blacks, fresh out of enslavement.

It was almost unheard of that such an achievement could be possible and; in the wake of the bloody suppression, the indomitable Jamaica Union of Teachers emerged at 1894. The era surrounding the riots of the 1930s across the Caribbean propelled the growth of unions representing workers of every class and description of work, not the least of which included varying categories of educators in Jamaica. In 1964, the JUT merged with four of these unions to become the powerful Jamaica Teachers' Association.

The survival of unionism in general and; teacher unionism in particular, depends largely on ensuring that the JTA and the other member unions of the Jamaica Confederation of Trade Unions (JCTU) protect the hard-won principle of collective bargaining. Free collective bargaining, as afforded through trade unionism, is still the best way to ensure the protection

of workers "against arbitrary and unjustly discriminatory employer action." (Farley, 1959).

We must be wary of the new Public Sector Compensation Review that seeks to, amongst other things: remove discrete motor vehicle concessions from travelling officers; roll in allowances into basic pay, thereby reducing in the long run, the ability of unions to negotiate for improvements for the particular sector.

The Minister of Finance, Dr. Nigel Clarke has taken pains to explain to the public, the government's position in implementing the new compensation structure across the system.

On the surface, the arguments appear to be both plausible and reasonable as articulated by the government. But we must never be found guilty of ethnic fatigue when the current combined climate of the JTC Bill and the Compensation Review threatens our very existence.

The JTA, while vociferously challenging particular troubling aspects of the Bill, must ensure that we make our position equally clear through our endorsements, affiliations and presence. To be clear, the Union cannot afford to be caught off guard by those who would seek to undermine its relevance and; declare that it has outlived its usefulness.

Colleagues in all sectors of the education system should understand that if ever a time we needed unionism, it is now. Neither haste, nor insularity will serve us well in this zeitgeist that resembles the 1930s and precedence will be established by both the scrutiny and action (or lack thereof) that we take. May we heed the caution of our ancestors who would remind us... "fyah deh a muss muss tail him tink a cool breeze."



Men In Education Conference 2022





Time for Business Unusual in Education

Many people often shy away from or tend to deny the weight of reality. The fact of the matter is, if one is not part of the solution then, by default, one becomes part of the problem.

Consequently, as a nation and more so a body of leaders and nation builders, we cannot sit casually by, play politics and procrastinate on matters pertaining to education, discipline and youth development. This folly is to the detriment of us

Examine with me, this case in point, to better conceptualize the depth of the precipice in which we will find ourselves, if a better path is not forged; expeditiously too.

Imagine the youngster who has spent his/her school life galloping around the school's campus, on the very limited number of days he/she attends. Now this same youngster's tenure has ended and he/she is graduating this year. The reality of the situation is that after five long years and sometimes even

six (because the child may have repeated grade), he/she may be leaving his/her secondary education level institutionwithout a single subject pass in the recognized school leaving exam.

tem, there are many youngsters, who are in this very same position and like objects on a conveyor belt in a factory, these youth are ushered out to join the unemployment line.

A very large number of school leavers do not transition to tertiary education in Jamaica, as they are either not eligible or unable to, as a result of financial challenges or other concerns.

As guardians of the gate and preservers of our nation's best interest, holistic development and ultimate progress, we need to take immediate, decisive and practical actions, as an initial response to this deep rooted issue, which has the potential to grow and spread, causing chaos and mayhem, within our society.

The issue with underperformance will never be fixed with mass CSEC revision classes just before exams or Ministry operated summer school.

Together, these actions are a giant step in the right direction, to contribute to the overall, holistic, self-development of the individual, thus ultimately resulting in improved academic performance.

It's my belief that you will never find a single school that is doing very well, academically, but has less than an eighty-five percent attendance and or punctuality rat-

However, there are many schools in Jamaica, far too many that still have not demonstrated their understanding of the significance of attendance and punctuality on performance.

We must accept that the following is our stark reality.

- 1. A number of our Jamaican students only receive parenting when they are at school.
- 2. Schools that are creating positive waves, cannot and should not depend solely on the Ministry to realize the outcomes that are needed for the cohort of the institution to thrive and succeed.
- 3. We know only too well that sometimes when you write to the Ministry, on issues pertaining to initiatives regarding the development of the institution or operational improvement, you never ever receive a response.
- 4. We know only too well that many children leave our school spaces and are recruited as hard core criminals each year.

Mrs Grant Francis started her career as a pre-trained teacher at Burnt Savannah Primary School, St Elizabeth in 1975 and retired as Principal at Porus Primary School in Manchester, in 2012.

Her stellar career spanning 46 years has been marked by innovation and accomplishment at several institutions and in the lives of the countless people she has served and with whom she has interacted over the years.

Mrs Grant Francis was educated at Bethlehem Teachers' College, Teachers Certificate; Church Teacher's College, Diploma; University of the West Indies, Bachelor's Degree, and Nova Southeastern University in Florida, Master's Degree.

THE GOLDEN TORCH AWARD:

Reflecting On Celebration Teachers Who Make A Difference

The 1990s was a period that saw an eruption of accomplishments and political upheavals. Early in that decade the Golden Torch Award was conceptualized by the Jamaica Teachers' Association (JTA).

It was born out of the view that teachers were not being adequately recognised for their contribution to nation building. Ray Howell, in 1993, pioneered the "The Golden Torch Award" as he sought to highlight the positive elements of education.

Driven by a passion for service to teachers and teaching, Mr Howard felt that they should be lauded on a national level for pedagogical fortitude spanning over 35 years of service. Sponsorship was sought and acquired from Alcan Bauxite Company (then), who provided support for 20 years; The Jamaica Teachers' Association Credit Union and The TIP Friendly Society.

The naming of the award was collaborative, with Basil Benjie (former Regional Officer, South East Region) suggesting the term "Golden" and the committee assisting with the planning adding the word "Torch", thus coining the title "The Golden Torch Award."

It was earmarked for the first Thursday in July 1993. Since then, thousands of teachers have been recognised and have come to appreciate the accolades given to them, using it in some cases as a connecting tool with batch mates they have not seen for decades.

My Top 8 Self Care Strategies

The demands and challenges of everyday life can really take a toll on your physical, mental and emotional health. Now more than ever self-care is critical in navigating all the spheres of our environment, and neglecting it inevitably will have ramifications that significantly impact not just our productivity but also our relationships. Self-care is not selfish

We all have so many roles to fulfill in our daily lives. Sometimes we may feel like we are being tugged in a million directions. Quite often, we may feel drained and exhausted. If we consistently neglect to attend to our personal needs then we won't have the energy required to function well in our various capacities.

The whole idea is to nurture yourself so that the best version of you is available to all those you love and care for.

Why is self-care important?

Lack of self-care may increase irritability, anxiety and depression. So essentially it has an impact on mental health. Taking the time to

recharge and to focus on yourself can help you to have a different perspective on reality. It can help you to gain clarity on challenges you may be experiencing and subsequently find resolutions more easily. This, in effect, could reduce stress significantly.

MY TOP 8 STRATEGIES

1. Pray. Meditate. Breathe

Prayer helps me to connect to my source-- God. It helps to keep me centered and grounded. Praying is food for my spirit. Meditation can



be viewed as checking out to check in with yourself. It doesn't have to be long. It can even be as short as three minutes. Take the time, when you can, to rein in your thoughts if you feel they're getting out of control. Practice breathing exercises. They help your body to regulate nervous tension. One of my favorite breathing exercises is the 5-5-5 method. Breathe in slowly on the count of five. Then hold your breath for 5 and then slowly release for 5.

2. Exercise. This doesn't have to be strenuous. You can start off by walking. You may be saying "I don't have the appropriate physical surroundings to go walking." Well.... Did you know that there are walking exercise videos on You Tube that you can do at home? Pretty soon you'll want to include other types of exercises.

The benefits of exercise are tremendous. Make it non-negotiable. Do it even when you don't feel like it. Warning: You won't feel like it most of the time. Don't let your feelings rule you. Don't even think about it. Just start before your mind can figure out what your body is doing. By that time, you would be finished and you will feel awesome. You won't regret doing it but you will regret

not doing it.

3. Gratitude Journal I make note of the things I am grateful for. This has helped to change my mindset significantly. Let me be honest with you. My mind has a tendency to lean more towards negative thoughts. So, if something goes wrong during the day, that thought tends to dominate my mind.

Forcing myself to be thankful for even the simplest things helps me to train my mind to focus on positivity. Think grateful thoughts right through the day especially if you are experiencing a stressful moment. I also try to find the teachable moments of negative situations. I often ask myself what



can I learn from this?

4. Learn to say no. Say no to things that pose a threat to your mental stability or derail any progress you have made. Don't be afraid of what others may think if you don't agree to some requests, especially if they are unreasonable. Would you rather please them or save your sanity? When you say no, this may lead to judgements and negative criticisms. Don't give life to these things by dwelling on them. Develop the habit of not keeping offense but learn from each situation so you won't be blindsided.

5. Make time for fun and be intentional about it. Recharging and rejuvenating is important.

Fun doesn't have to be expensive. Watch a funny movie. One that literally makes you roll on the floor with laughter. Comedies not your thing? Then find movies in the genres that you love which will help you to relax.

Don't like movies? How about some music? You probably have lots of favorites. Crank up the volume, sing along and dance. Not feeling up to it? Fake it till you feel it! Do you live close to the beach? Throw on your swimsuit and head on out. Do what you love and what works for you.

6. Dress up and show up. Do you like to get your hair and nails done? Go for it. Take out those outfits you've been meaning to wear and just wear them already! When you feel good about yourself you tend to perform better.

7. Eat right but treat yourself.

Denying yourself 100% of all the things you love to eat will make you 100% miserable. Ice cream and cake (just about any kind) take me to my happy place so once in a while I indulge. Just don't overdo it. Moderation is key.

8. Sleep. Studies show that lack of sleep causes deterioration in mind and body. When you get enough sleep, your cells are able to regenerate and your body has the opportunity to repair itself. Getting more snooze time in, may
